THE VALUES & RESPONSIBILITIES OF HEALTH ALLOCATIONS

Over eighty people were at the Christman Forum on 3rd December, where the speaker was Mr. Harry Kannegiesser. He promised a "down to earth" opinion on how health issues in our community might be solved, and gave a most interesting and challenging address in many areas, suggesting that ethical as well as financial considerations should be involved in decisions such as how best we should allocate scarce resources. He stressed that he himself is not a health professional but a lecturer in Historical and Philosophical Studies, with a strong personal interest in health science. He pointed out that we do have a funding crisis in Australia. Health is only one part of a complex economy. We cannot call for cuts in taxes and increased health benefit costs at such a time.

He then listed the pressures on our health budget today - our ageing population, the diseases of affluence, the increase in range and complexity of specialist services, and the wide expectations the public holds in such services. And yet we all ask for lower taxes. We cannot have it both ways. So what should we do? We must take more responsibility ourselves by examining our life-styles, e.g. with diet and exercise.

As funds are inadequate, whom should we treat? He placed constant emphasis on the need for more balance between <u>public</u> and <u>private</u> spending. There has been a very strong shift to the former since the introduction of Medicare. Younger people today have much higher expectations and different priorities, so tend to drop private health cover. As people grow older they move more into private cover, which of course is also partly funded from the public purse.

So, what should we do? Obviously we should try to increase funding, and reduce demand. He then suggested ways we might achieve both.

- To increase revenue: (1) change our attitudes towards insurance;
- (2) add alcohol and tobacco levies directly into the health allotment;
- (3) impose a levy on unsafe work places until they conform with industrial standards; (4) place a special health-care levy upon retirement; (5) if necessary, offset health costs for the aged against assets, until after death.

To reduce demand Mr. Kannegiesser suggests the following ways should help: by prevention, through altering our diets and life styles (exercise, weight control, alcohol, tobacco); by improving driving habits; by health education in such areas as safe sex, AIDS, hepatitis, etc.; and in the allocation of palliative care e.g. for aged terminally ill, accident cases beyond recovery, and complex issues like terminating pregnancies and euthanasia (this last is very expensive, and takes scarce resources from other questionably more important areas).

This summary is quite inadequate for such an important subject. The number of questions and interest shown convinced us that this session was not nearly long enough for further information and discussion.

I am sure all who attended were stimulated to further thought, and no doubt to some action too.

THE CRUSADES A MEDIEVIL INTERCONTINENTAL CONFLICT

CONVENER: PROF. ANDREW EKRENKREUTZ

Could you hear the clashing of swords and scimitars, the twang of arrows and the smell of "Greek Fire"? Did you thrill to the tales of Saladin and Richard the Lionheart, recoil at the atrocities of the Field of Blood and the sack of Constantinople or read of the fall of Acre and Antioch? Did you travel from France and Sicily to Egypt, Turkey, Syria and the Latin Kingdom of Jerusalem? If not, you obviousdly did not participate in this course.

We will never forget the date of the Battle of Manzikert in 1071, when the Seljuk Turks defeated the Christian Byzantine army. Andrew's tie, embroidered with the date 1071, was a constant reminder. We gained insight into the power of the Fatimids, the Druses, the Seljuks, the mysterious Assassins, as well as an understanding of the great rulers, clergy, knights and soldiers. The Golden Hordes, the Mongols and the Mambuks from Egypt also made an appearance as they overran the lands of the Middle East.

The maps of medieval kingdoms, the cultural changes which followed in the wake of the Crusades and the dissemination of artistic and intellectual ideas gave glimpses of new horizons.

The complexity of motives initiating the Crusades were dictated by religious dogma, political alliances, territorial ambitions and trade opportunism. These all contributed to the victories and defeats for both sides for more than two centuries of warfare in conquest of the Holy Land and the jewel in the crown, Jerusalem. The first Crusade began in 1096. In 1099 Jerusalem was captured and held until 1244 when it fell to the forces of Saladin. The last Christian bulwark of Acre was conquered by the Mambuks in 1291. In our own time, seven centuries later, the cast has changed but the play continues.

The encouragement to read widely and the privilege of attending a Symposium on the Crusades at Melbourne University to commemorate the 700th anniversary of the fall of Acre were thanks to the wide ranging scholarship of our tutor. The class of 1991 salutes him.
