SENIOR CITIZENS WEEK FORUM ADDRESS BY DR.DAVIS McCAUGHEY 10.30 a.m. 25th March,1993

In February 1986, as his first responsibility as Governor of Victoria, Dr. McCaughey addressed the inaugural U3A Conference held at Monash University, so it seems appropriate that during his first year of retirement, Dr. McCauighey returns to address Hawthorn U3A members and friends.

The Hawthorn Council have generously provided the use of the Hawthorn Town Hall for our forum, a fitting venue for such an eminent Senior Citizen and Speaker.

During a very distinguished career

Dr. McCaughney AC 1987, MA, DD Hon, LLD, F.A.C.E. has served as Governor of Victoria (1986–91), Deputy Chancellor of Melbourne University for two periods, 1982–85 and 1987–89, and Master of Ormond College 1959–79, in addition to his pastoral duties. His role in the Church included dedication and commitment to the foundation of the Uniting Church in Australia culminating in his appointment as President of the First Assembly Uniting Church in Australia 1977–79.

Dr. McCaughey delivered the Boyer Lectures in 1988 choosing as his subject "Piecing Together a Shared Vision". His Australian Companion Award in 1987 cited his "Lifetime of Community Service".

We are very fortunate to have such a speaker for our Senior Citizens Week Forum and anticipate a large audience.

CHILDREN & TELEVISION

Children should learn from the beginning that television is not omnipotent, says Denis Prior. Mr Prior proved to be a very entertaining and interesting speaker at the end of year Forum in December, with firm ideas on children's viewing of the iniquitous box.

As an experienced critic and viewer, and with a young family of his own, he advises parents and grandparents to watch TV with their children and encourage them to think and react. He calls this 'noisy watching' or 'talking to the TV' and sees it as a way of desanctifying television.

Mr. Prior believes children should not be sat in front of the TV and allowed to just take it in in a mindless fashion, but trained to be critical from an early age with opinions on the credibility or possibility of what they are watching.

He also urged all TV viewers to protest personally, immediately, if they object to programmes. He suggests a list of station numbers should be kept in a prominent position near the telephone.
